### Green Lake on the South Llano

Most folks are not aware that there is water in the upper reaches of the South Llano, let alone a lake. But Green Lake – located on private property – is an impoundment of the South Llano several miles upstream of the uppermost crossing of Highway 377.

Green Lake was also the site of a shoot out between Texas Rangers and fence cutters in the 1880s. From 1883 to 1887, drought gripped the Edwards Plateau and cutting of fences became a big problem.

## Songs about Texas Rivers



They've both sung songs about Texas rivers...

Rivers also serve as a nostalgic reminder of home and childhood. They retain an eternal quality even when everything else has changed. In *There's a Rainbow on the Rio Colorado*, Autry croons that the rainbow on the river "calls me to my western Texas home." Rattlesnake Annie, who must leave her Brazos River home, laments "goodbye to a river, goodbye to the trees, goodbye to the night birds that sing in the breeze" in *Goodbye to a River*.
