



More about Gamel Spring

In 1847, John Meusebach passed this way enroute to the treaty meeting in the Sloan Community in San Saba

County. Near the spring, he met with Comanche Chief Ketemoczy (for whom the Mason County community of Katemcy is named) to organize the treaty meeting.

The spring supplied Fort Mason when it opened in 1851 and was called Dragoon Spring. Later, renamed Gamel Spring, it suppled water to the



swimming pool in 1940. The photo, provided by Scott Zesch, was taken in 1928. Today, no signs of the spring exist.
